



# SPORTS HALL OF FAME







Rupert G. Curry was born July 6, 1930 in St. Louis, Missouri. He attended John Marshall Elementary School graduating from Sumner High School in 1948. In high school, Rupert was a member of the football and track teams. As a football player he lettered three years, was named to the All-State football team in 1946 and 1947, and, in 1947, was the first black to be selected to the St. Louis All-City football team. He was state champion and the Missouri record holder, all four years, as a shot put and discus thrower.

He enrolled at West Virginia State College in 1949 where he was a member of the baseball and football teams.

In baseball he was a catcher with a .444 batting average. During a game with Central State University all of the Yellow Jacket pitchers had developed sore arms and Coach Cardwell asked Rupert to pitch. Not only did he pitch, he hit two doubles, two home runs, and won the game by a large margin.

A guard in football, Rupert was selected All-C.I.A.A. in 1951 and 1952, and All-American in 1952. He also kicked extra points, kick-offs, and at one point, he was called upon to throw passes from his pulling guard position. In his first attempt at a play designed by Coach Cardwell named the "Curry Special," he threw a 70 yard pass for a touchdown. The play required Rupert to pull out of the line behind Willie "Suitcase" Smith. Smith would fake the run, turn and lateral to Curry who would throw a forward pass to Paul Nelson, behind the defenders, for a touchdown.

He graduated from WVSC with a B.S. degree in education in 1953.

After college Rupert served two years in the U.S. Army as an artillery officer. From 1955 until 1965 he taught in the Maryland Public School system. In 1965 he began working for the IBM Corporation where he is Manager, Employee/Management Development. While serving as IBM's senior community relations representative he convinced IBM to make a contribution of \$10,000 to a Washington, DC group called "The Workshop for Careers in the Arts." From this beginning, Vincent Reed, while serving as superintendent of schools in Washington, created the Duke Ellington School for the Arts. From this small start the television program **FAME** was developed.


Rupert also coached recreational football in Rockville, Maryland, During the thirteen years he coached his teams have won 10 championships, six of them consecutively, and he was named Coach of the Year.

He was elected the first black to the Rockville City Council and was the election's top vote getter. He was appointed, by the Governor of Maryland, to the Board of Trustees of St. Mary's College. Rupert is a member of the N.A.A.C.P., the Jerusalem United Methodist Church, president of the Patuxent Rod and Gun Club, chairman of the board of St. Mary's College, a life member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, and president of Curry Associates.

Rupert and his wife, Irene, have three children, Cheryl, Rupert G. II, and Robert.

## ROBERT PACK DIGGS Class of 1931



Robert "Pack" Diggs was born January 19, 1911 in Lynchburg, Virginia. He attended elementary and high schools in Baltimore, where he graduated from Douglass High School in 1927. In high school, "Pack" was nominated to receive an award for top grades in psychology, he was class president, and the winner of the Douglass High School Tennis Tournament.

After high school "Pack" enrolled at Morgan State University. He later learned of West Virginia State College through President Prillerman and enrolled in 1928.

At State he was a member of the Yellow Jacket basketball team, as a forward, with Jonathan Giles, Sonny Ross, Jim Wood, Chappie Willette, Pete Campbell, Palmer Whitted and Earnest Wade, and coached by A. P. Hamblin.

He received his B.S. degree in 1931. Later that year he did graduate work in biology at Atlanta University. In 1946 he earned a masters degree in secondary education from New York University.

"Pack" has worked as a teacher, assistant principal and principal. He was assistant principal, firom 1955 to 1956, and principal, from 1956 to 1969 at Dunbar High School in Baltimore. He also worked for Curriculum Development Supervision and Project Mission from 1969 until 1973.

He is a member of the Maryland Commission on Hereditary Disorders, a board member of the Baltimore chapter of the American Red Cross, Urban League, and a life member of the N.A.A.C.P. Other affiliations are the Retired Teachers Association, Y.M.C.A., trustee for Trinity Baptist Church, Phi Delta Kappa, N.E.A., Beta Kappa Chi, Baltimore Alumni chapter W.V.S.C., and a 50-year member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.

In 1972 he was elected to the Dunbar High School Hall of Fame.

He and his wife, Cleo, have one daughter, H. Lynn Robinson.

## CLYDE DILLARD Class of 1950



Clyde "Hoss" Dillard was born May 30, 1923 in Lumberport, West Virginia. He graduated from Kelly Miller High School in 1942. While at Kelly Miller he was outstanding in football, basketball and track for high school coach Mark H. Cardwell. He was selected to the All-State football team as a fullback and honorary captain in 1942.

After high school, "Hoss" was called to military service, in the Army Air Force, serving 19 additional months overseas duty in the C.B.I. theatre of operation. He received an honorable discharge in 1946.


In the fall of 1946 Clyde enrolled at West Virginia State College. At State he was a four-year member and captain of the football team in 1949 and 1950. He was named to the All-American team in 1949 and 1950, C.I.A.A. Honorable Mention, as a fullback, in 1946-47, and All-C.I.A.A. Second team, as a center, in 1947-48. He graduated from State in 1950 with a B.S. degree in vocational agriculture.


Clyde was a teacher and coach at Kelly Miller High School in Clarksburg, West Virginia from 1950 to 1956. In 1956, he moved to Seattle, Washington where he was employed by the Boeing Company until 1968. He began teaching again, in 1968, at Nelson Junior High School, McKnight Middle School, and Hazen High School, where he taught physical education, was attendance counselor, and football and wrestling coach.

He is married to the former Marion Cook. They have six daughters, Dena, 38; Lydia, 34; Octavia, 32; Cynthia, 30; Celeste, 27; and Judith, 25. They also have one son, Mitchell, 23, who played football for Washington State University as an end. Clyde is a member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

Joe W. Gilliam was born March 26, 1931 in Steubenville, Ohio. He attended Grant Elementary School and graduated, in 1945, from Steubenville High School. In high school Joe was a three-year letterman in basketball and football and was named to the Ohio All-State football team.

In the fall of 1945 Joe enrolled at Indiana University, attending for one semester before entering the U.S. Army.

In the fall of 1947, Joe enrolled at West Virginia State College. During his years at State he was a four-year member of the basketball and football teams. As a member of the Yellow Jackets basketball team Joe played both the guard and forward positions. The Yellow Jackets won the C.I.A.A. regular season championships in 1948, 1949, and 1951. They also won the C.I.A.A. Tournament Championships in 1948, 1949, 1950, and 1951. The 1948 basketball team was the only undefeated collegiate team in the nation. Joe was named to the C.I.A.A. All-Tournament team in 1950 and was captain of the Yellow Jackets in 1950 and 1951.

As a member of the football team Joe played quarterback. He was named to the All-C.I.A.A. football team and an All-American in 1949.

Joe graduated with a B.S. degree in education in 1952. He attended graduate school at the University of Pittsburgh and received a masters degree from the University of Kentucky in 1963.

He was the head coach of all sports at Oliver High School in Winchester, Kentucky from 1952 to 1955; offensive backfield coach and instructor of physical education at Jackson State University from 1955 to 1957; head football coach and assistant professor at Kentucky State University from 1957 to 1959; head coach of all sports at Bate High School in Danville, Kentucky from 1959 to 1961, and from 1961 to 1963 he was assistant professor and defense coordinator at Jackson State University.


In 1963 Joe went to Tennessee State University, where he is presently working. During the past 24 years at T.S.U. Joe has served as associate professor of health, physical education and recreation with permanent tenure, assistant head football coach, director of offense, and director of defense. His coaching record, in football, is 220 wins, 62 losses, and 13 ties. He has coached four undefeated teams and 10 National Football Championship teams.

He was inducted into the Ohio Valley Hall of Fame, Tennessee State Hall of Fame, selected to Who's Who in Secondary Schools and Colleges, and was the Kentucky High School Coach of the Year in 1954. He has been published in the Coach and Athlete magazine, Scholastic Coach magazine, and the Athletic Journal. He is a member of the American Football Coaches Association and A.A.H.P.E.R. Association.

Joe is married to the former Ruth Lockhart. They have one daughter, Kimberly, and two sons, Craig, who is a defense coach at Tennessee State University, and Joe, Jr., who was a quarterback for the Pittsburgh Steelers of the N.F.L. and the Washington Federals of the U.S.F.L. Joe Jr., was born on the campus of West Virginia State College in 1950.



## JACK HOBART HOUSEN Class of 1948



Jack Hobart Housen was born December 25, 1922 in Huntington, West Virginia. He graduated from Huntington's Douglas High School where he lettered in basketball and football. Jack was named to the West Virginia All-State Negro team in both basketball and football.

In 1940 he enrolled at West Virginia State College. Jack was a member of the 1940, 41, and 42 Yellow Jackets football team as a quarterback. He was selected Honorable Mention All-American quarterback by the Pittsburgh Courier in 1940 and 1942, also second team All-American in 1940 and All-American in 1942 by the Chicago Defender.

In 1943 Jack was called to active duty along with other members of the WVSC first R.O.T.C. unit and was one of the members to receive a commission during World War II.

After the war he returned to State to earn a B.S. degree in Health and Physical Education in 1948. In the fall of 1948 Jack enrolled in Springfield College in Massachusetts receiving a masters degree in Education in 1950.

Jack began his career as a teacher and coach at State Teachers University in North Carolina. He has served as teacher and coach at Second Ward High School in Charlotte, North Caroline from 1952-57; teacher at Robinson Junior High School in Toledo, Ohio 1958-62; teacher and coach at Fontana Junior High School in California; assistant principal at Alder and Marshall Junior High Schools in California; and as principal at Marshall Junior High and Ganesha High Schools in Pomona, California. He is presently a secondary school principal at Lorbeer Junior High in California.

Jack is a member of the N.A.A.C.P., National Association of Secondary School Principals, Association of Supervisors and Curriculums and Development. He was recognized in Who's Who in California.

Jack and his wife, Grace, have two daughters, Nicole and Jill, and one son, Jack Jr.

## HUBERT L. JONES Class of 1939



Hubert Ledyard "Hooks" Jones was born September 18, 1916, in Denver, Colorado to Ledyard C. and Ruth Jones.

He attended Whitten Elementary, Cole Junior High, and graduated from Denver's Manual High School in 1932. During his notable high school career he participated in basketball and football, being selected to the All-City team as an end.

"Hooks" enrolled at West Virginia State College in the fall of 1935. While his football career was ended by a serious injury, his basketball career was not affected. He played center for the basketball team and was team captain his junior and senior years. Coach Fred Clement often referred to "Hooks" as one who would always show responsibility for whatever strategies and tactics that were gainful for the team. In 1939 the Yellow Jackets won the basketball championship.

"Hooks" lettered in basketball for four years and was president of the "W" Club in 1938 and 1939.

After graduation, in 1939, with a B.S. degree in education, he earned a master of science degree in education from the University of Denver. Following graduate school he married the former Jane Jackson. They had one son, Philip, and two daughters, Dianne and Toni.

"Hooks" was called to the Army Air Corps at Tuskegee, Alabama. He was commissioned a second lieutenant and was later sent to Korea as a pilot during the Korean War.

After the war, he returned to the States and was assigned to Tuskegee Institute as commander of the ROTC program. He was promoted to colonel four years later and assumed the position as Director of Allotments and Retired Pay at the Air Force Accounting and Finance Center.


He received the following honors and awards during his military career: the bronze star; United Nations service medal; World War II Victory medal, Republic of Korea Presidential unit citation; National Defense Service medal, Air Force Longevity service award, and the Air Force commendation award. In 1977 the American Legion Post #87 was founded and named the Hubert L. Jones Post 87.

His civilian life was similarly balanced with honors. He was a member of the Urban League and the Y.M.C.A. in Denver. He also was an official in the People's Presbyterian Church U.S.A. and a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.


He lived a full and fruitful life until his death on August 24, 1975.

Joseph Cromwell Peters was born April 25, 1925 in Holden, West Virginia. He attended Logan County public schools graduating from Aracoma High School in 1943. After high school Joe entered the U.S. Army where he played football and baseball for the Army team in North Carolina, Wyoming, Colorado, and California. His North Carolina team played against North Carolina State, Wake forest, and Duke University. One of Joe's teammates was Norman Standee, fullback for the Chicago Bears.

In 1946 Joe entered West Virginia State College lettering in football and baseball. He was a center on the Yellow Jackets football team and was known as a tenacious baseball player with a strong throwing arm, a good hitter, excellent defensive player, and exceptionally fast.

He received a B.S. degree in business administration from West Virginia State in 1949. Upon completion of his college baseball career, Joe was offered a contract to play professionally with the Cleveland Indians.

In 1950 he received a masters degree in business administration from the University of Wisconsin.

Joe began to officiate football, basketball and baseball on the high school and collegiate level while attending college. He was the only official to attain the superior rating and maintain that rating for 18 consecutive years in all three sports.

In 1953 he began a distinguished career in West Virginia state government. Joe was the first and only black to become budget analyst for the West Virginia Budget Office. He was appointed to the position of State Commissioner of Finance and Administration. This was a highlight of his career and another first for blacks in West Virginia.

In 1969 he was appointed Vice President for Business Affairs at Marshall University, a position he held for 11 years.


Joe retired as Division Director in the State Tax Department. He is a member of the Optimist Club, N.A.A.C.P., University Business Officers, Life Member of the W.V.S.C. Alumni Association and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity.

He was selected as the Alumnus of the Year for West Virginia State in 1975.

His wife, Jean Freeman Peters, class of 1949, was the 1986 Alumnus of the Year.

Jean and Joe have three sons, Karl, Joseph, and Kelvin.

ROBERT L. SMITH Class of 1947



Robert "Sticky Fingers" Smith was born July 11, 1923 in Portsmouth, Virginia. He attended elementary and high schools in Portsmouth, where he graduated from I. C. Norcom High School in 1940. In high school, Bob was a member of the football and track teams.

He attended Norfolk Unit-Division of Virginia Union University and enrolled at West Virginia State College in 1942 earning a B.S. degree in mathematics in 1947.

While at State he lettered in football, baseball, tennis, track and swimming. In football, Bob lettered four years as an end. He caught eleven passes in a game against Johnson C. Smith College in 1943 and was selected Honorable Mention All-C.I.A.A. in 1946.

In baseball he lettered four years as an infielder and was captain of the team for two years.

In track and field he lettered four years, was captain of the team for two years, and ran the anchor leg on the 440 and mile relays.

Bob lettered four years as a singles and doubles player, was captain of the team and, in 1945, was selected to the All-C.I.A.A. tennis team.

After graduating from State he received a master of arts degree in Health and Physical Education from Columbia University. He played semi-pro football for the Norfolk Brown Bombers and Newport News Commandoes.

Bob coached for 19 years at Norcom High School, where his teams won two state basketball championships; 6 Eastern District baseball championships; finished third in the National High School basketball tournament, and won 8 Eastern District basketball championships.

He coached basketball and taught physical education at Norfolk State University from 1969 to 1973. His career basketball coaching record is 386 wins and 118 losses. For high school, he has been honored as State of Virginia Coach of the Year twice for basketball; Eastern District Coach of the Year in basketball three times; and Eastern District Coach of the Year in baseball five times.

As a collegiate coach his record stands at 86 wins and 24 losses. He was selected as the C.I.A.A. Outstanding Coach in 1971. His teams won three C.I.A.A. season championships and two tournament championships.

He was inducted into the Norcom Athletic Hall of Fame, as the first player and coach, in 1986. Bob officiated football, basketball, baseball, track and softball for 33 years in the C.I.A.A. and V.I.A.L. He is a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Zion Baptist Church, president of the Hampton Roads Alumni Chapter of W.V.S.C., and a Life Member of the West Virginia State College Alumni Association.

He is married to the former Wilhelmenia Dawson, W.V.S.C. class of 1946, and they have one son, Robert Jr.




