


A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE COLLEGE NATIONAL "W" CLUB

On a fall West Virginia Sunday morning in 1975, the day after West Virginia State's Homecoming, a group of West Virginia State College alumni met in a Charleston, West Virginia hotel. The agenda was to brainstorm as to how to raise funds for athletics as well as restore athletics to the status of previous years. The open discussion was chaired by Attorney William Lonesome, an alumnus of the school and a very distinguished community leader.

After several hours of discussion, it was decided that a National "W" Club would be formed to raise funds for athletic programs.

A year later, in 1976, a meeting was held the night before the Homecoming game to formally establish a new National "W" Club.

The first officers of the National "W" Club elected at the 1976 meeting were: Dr. Frank E. Enty, president; Rupert G. Curry, vice president; Herbert B. Thompson, treasurer and Herbert H. Henderson, attorney/secretary

Attorney Herbert Henderson was assigned the responsibility of acquiring corporate status for the organization. The hard, long, pro-bono legal work of Mr. Henderson gained corporate status for the National "W" Club in 1978. The incorporators were Dr. Frank E. Enty, Rupert Curry, Herbert B. Thompson, William L. Lonesome, and Herbert Henderson.

Washington, DC was selected as the home base for the National "W" Club.

Herbert Thompson wrote the first by-laws for the National "W" Club.

In 1979, at a "W" Club Homecoming meeting, Mr. Glover Smiley proposed the establishing of an Athletic Hall of Fame. It was voted on and passed by the membership. The first Hall of Famers were inducted in 1980. They were: Chester A. Burris; Mark H. Cardwell; Samuel A. Gamble; Vasco D. Hale; Adolph P. Hamblin; Louis R. W. Johnson; Earl Lloyd; Floyd Meadows; Roderick L. Price and Marvin H. Richardson.

Former presidents of the National "W" Club are Dr. Frank Enty, Rupert Curry, Vandy Miller and Madison Broadnax. In 1990, Henry R. Bellinger was elected to the presidency.

On October 13, 1990, the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame, dedicated to Coach Mark H. Cardwell, was opened. This facility located in the Canty House, on the campus of West Virginia State College, showcases academic and athletic triumphs of West Virginia State College athletes.

In Memoriam

MARVIN H. RICHARDSON CLASS OF 1937

Mr. Richardson was an outstanding coach and teacher at South Charleston High School. While attending West Virginia State College he ran track and played football. In track he ran the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard dash and was a member of the 440 and 880 yard relay teams. He was a halfback on the 1936-37 CIAA and Midwest championship football team. He was inducted into the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame as a charter member in 1980.

EDWARD M. STARLING CLASS OF 1951

Edward M. Starling was born January 2, 1925 in Leaksville, North Carolina. He later moved to Williamson, West Virginia where he attended Liberty High School and was a member of the baseball, basketball, and football teams. Ed lettered in all three sports and was named to the All-State team in basketball and football his senior year.

After graduation in 1943, he served in the U.S. Army until 1946. He took part in the invasions of Salerno, Italy and southern France and served in the pacific Theater of Operations at Okinawa.


In 1947 he enrolled in West Virginia State College. As a Yellow Jacket, Ed was a member of the football and basketball teams, lettering in both in his junior and senior years. He was a member of the 1948 basketball team which was the only undefeated team in the United States with a 30-0 record. Ed was named Honorable Mention All-American in football in 1951. He graduated in 1951 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education. He was inducted into the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame in 1986.


JOHN M. BATES CLASS OF 1937

Dr. John M. Bates, known as "Showboat," participated in three varsity sports at West Virginia State College: baseball, basketball and football. He lettered in basketball and football and was a member of the 1936 CIAA and Midwest championship football team.

After receiving a B.S. degree in 1937 from West Virginia State College, Dr. Bates began in illustrious career in education and coaching. He taught and coached several sports at colleges and high schools in Mississippi, North Carolina, Georgia and Colorado.

He received numerous awards for his dedication in the field of education. John M. Bates was inducted into the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame in 1982.





Coach Irvin "Doc" Cannaday was born in Roanoke, VA on Sept. 15, 1922. He is the oldest of nine children. At that time he lived in front of Harrison High School. This gave him the opportunity to watch the late Coach Fred Lawson's high school football team. He watched this team daily, and decided at the age of four that he wanted to be a coach like Mr. Lawson.

Many steps were taken before Cannaday became a coach. Coach Cannaday dropped out of high school and went to work for the Norfolk and Western Railway to earn money to help support his family.

Two years later on the job, the older workers went to the foreman and asked for a raise. They were told that if they received a raise the Modock Gang, in which Cannaday was a part, would be laid off. The older workers agreed that they didn't care, so Cannaday and eleven others were sent from the Modock Gang to work the night shift in the East End Shops; thus, giving Irvin "Doc" Cannaday a chance to return to high school to complete his education.

He was drafted into World War II for thirty-six months. He returned to Roanoke and in September, 1946, entered West Virginia State College majoring in Physical Education, Recreation, and Safety. He graduated on May 27, 1950 with a B.S. Degree.

Following his graduation from WVSC, "Doc" coached football and basketball in the Roanoke Virginia School System where he has been recognized as one of the most dedicated coaches in the field of education and athletics.



JOSEPH "PEPE" GOUGH CLASS OF 1925

Much of West Virginia State College's progress and publicity has been brought about through its excellent athletic programs. In the earlier period (1921-25), there was a series of victorious football teams bearing Old Gold and Black. During this time, a great deal of the success of this football team must be attributed to the quarterback, Joseph "Pepe" Gough.

Joseph was born in Charleston, West Virginia where he received his early education and availed himself of every opportunity to satisfy his longing for the acquisition of knowledge. He was the second of five generations of Gough descendants to attend WVSC during the past 100 years. He graduated from State in 1925 and received his M.A. degree from West Virginia University.

During his four year stint at State, Joseph "Pepe" Gough was quarterback on the same team with Hall of Fame inductees Coach Mark Cardwell and All-American William Moore. While reigning as quarterback, the football team amassed an enviable record of only two losses and two tie scores. It is recorded in the EL OJO (WVSC's 1924 Yearbook) that "Joseph's ability to twirl passes from the quarterback position is all but miraculous."

Joseph was not only an outstanding quarterback but also a leader and active participant in other campus activities: baseball, inter-class basketball, Espanol Club, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, and the Historical Research Society.


The professional life of Joseph has been spent in the educational arena. In 1954, he was one of two Black teachers selected to integrate the staff of the prestigious Stonewall Jackson High School in Charleston. He served on numerous educational committees designed to help formulate plans to integrate schools in West Virginia and to improve state-wide athletic and academic programs.

Honor and success come not only to the living, but also to the deceased who have helped to pave the trail for future generations, in particular, Black youth. May our minds keep afresh the memory of these pioneers.

JOHN C. SALES CLASS OF 1950

John C. Sales was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania on October 10, 1926. He is the seventh of eight children born to James Vance and Mary Martha Sales.

He obtained his education from the



Pittsburgh School System, and graduated from Westinghouse High School in June, 1944. While a student there, John received varsity letters in gymnastics, swimming, and track. He also won first and third place at the Pittsburgh City High School Championship Meet on June 6, 1944, the same day the allied forces invaded the Normandy beaches of France during World War II.


John enrolled at West Virginia State College as a Health, Physical Education and Recreation major in the Fall of 1945. As a walk-on, he proceeded to make Coach Mark Cardwell's first WVSC football squad at the half-back position. Recurring injuries during the season contributed to the failure to letter; however, swimming as a varsity sport became the viable varsity sport option.

John C. Sales was a pioneer in the development of swimming as a competitive sport at State. He lettered in swimming in the 1946-1947, 1948-49, and 1949-50 school years. He was co-captain of the first varsity swimming team in WVSC history. John excelled in diving, the back and free-style strokes in individual events, and as a member of relay teams. In 1948, he co-captained the swimming team in the first C.I.A.A. swimming championships. West Virginia State College finished in a tie for first place with Hampton Institute, and the schools were declared co-champions of the C.I.A.A. John was the silver medalist in the diving competition.

During the 1947-48 football and basketball seasons, he earned varsity recognition as a cheerleader because of multiple talents in gymnastics, swimming, and diving.

John is very active as a community volunteer and has frequently been recognized by awards and letters of appreciation. Athletically, he competes every year in the Maryland State Senior Olympics in the ten pin bowling and golf event. In 1988 bowling competition, he won the first place gold medal for the age group with a record-setting three game total score which still remains the record for that age group and the second best score ever bowled for all age groups.

John and his wife, Janet, have two daughters and three grandsons.



WILLIAM R. LEFEVRE CLASS OF 1964

William R. LeFevre was born on July 18, 1939 in Albany, New York to Nelson T. and Beulah B. LeFevre. He has 3 brothers, Nelson, Donald, and Lonnie.


Bill attended Philip Schuyler High School in Albany and led the basketball team to championships in his junior and senior years. He was chosen as the outstanding basketball player on his team.

He came to West Virginia State College in 1958. He is listed in Who's Who Among American University and College Students. While playing basketball at WVSC, he averaged 24 points per game; and during one game, had a high scoring game of 52 points. Bill was also placed on the All-American, All-Conference, and All- Tournament Teams in the NAIA while a basketball player at State.

Mr. LeFevere entered into the Air Force after his graduation from WVSC. While in the Air Force, he played basketball at Lackland Air Force Base in Texas and once again led his teams to championships in 1964 and 1965. During those two years he was chosen as the team's most outstanding player.

Bill and his wife, Elsie, have three sons, William Robert, Robert William, and Lawrence Terrell.

Presently, Bill is an Affirmative Action and EEO Specialist.



HAZO WILLIAM CARTER, JR.

Dr. Hazo William Carter, Jr. was appointed the ninth President of West Virginia State College (WVSC) on September 1, 1987. He is an educator who is beginning his 21st year as a college administrator. For twelve of those years, he has been the chief executive officer (C.E.O.) at a higher education institution. Prior to coming to West Virginia, Dr. Carter was President and Professor of Education at Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Arkansas, a position that he held for four years.

He bagan his career in higher education administration at Norfolk State University where he served as Executive Assistant to the President; Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs; and, as the Vice President for Student Affairs. While there, he was also a tenured Associate Professor of Journalism.

A native of Nashville, Tennessee, Dr. Carter holds a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree in English from Tennessee State University (Nashville); the Master of Science (M.S.) degree in Journalism from the University of Illinois (Champaign-Urbana); and, the Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) degree, with a major in Higher Education Administration, from George Peabody College for Teachers of Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee. He has also completed postdoctoral study in College Management at the Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsuburgh, PA.

Throughtout his career, President Carter has worked actively with various educational, civic and religious organizations. Through his leadership, effective Cluster Programs (comprised of persons from the business, industry, and education communities) have been established at Norfolk State University, Philander Smith College, and West Virginia State College.

Dr. Carter continues to associate himself with a variety of educational, civic, and community development organizations. On the national level, he is an active member of the Appointments Committee of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools; the American Council on Education, where he served on the Commission on Educational Credit and credentials (1993-95); the American Association of State Colleges and Universities' Committee on Accreditation; and the National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education, where he served on the Board of Directors (1992-93).

Dr. Carter has been the recipient of numerous awards and honors. He was awarded a United States Presidential Citation in 1985 for his work with the National Alliance of Business College and Industry Relations Cluster Programs. Each year, since 1987, he has received the WVSC Student Government Association's distinguished service award. He has also received the highest achievement award in education from his alma mater, Tennessee State University, in recognition of his outstanding service and accomplisshments in the field of education.

President Carter serves on the boards of directors of the National Institute for Chemical Studies: West Virginia Association of College and University Presidents, where he served as secretary (1992): INROADS-West Virginia: Business and Industrial Development Corporation: Community Council of Kanawha Valley; and, the Charleston Regional Chamber of Commerce and Development, where he served as vice president for education (1994) and chairman of the Education Committee. He is chairman of the boards for the West Virginia State College Research and Development Corporation, and the Metro Area Agency on Aging; and, he is a member of the Executive Committee of the WVSC Foundation, Inc. and, chairman (1991 to present) of the Presidents Council of the State College System of West Virginia.

His other memberships include the Charleston Rotary; West Virginia Chamber of Commerce's Education Committee; the Advisory Committee of the United National Bank-Dunbar; and, the Peabody College Alumni Board. He is a member of Phi Delta Kappa, Alpha Kappa Mu and Psi Chi honor societies. In addition to his civic and scholastic achievements, he has authored and co-authored several articles relevant to education.

Dr. Carter is married to the former Phyllis W. Harden of Norfolk, Virginia. Mrs. Carter is an attorney and is licensed to practice law in West Virginia, Arkansas, and Virginia. She serves on the West Virginia Employment Security Board of Review and has a private law practice in Charleston.

The Carters have one daughter, Angela. The family resides in Institute and are members of the Simpson Memorial United Methodist Church in Charleston.
