



A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE COLLEGE NATIONAL "W" CLUB

On a fall West Virginia Sunday morning in 1975, the day after West Virginia State's Homecoming, a group of West Virginia State College alumni met in a Charleston, West Virginia hotel. The agenda was to brainstorm as to how to raise funds for athletics as well as restore athletics to the status of previous years. The open discussion was chaired by Attorney William Lonesome, an alumnus of the school and a very distinguished leader.

After several hours of discussion, it was decided that a National "W" club would be formed to raise funds for athletic programs.

A year later, in 1976, a meeting was held the night before the Homecoming game to formally establish a new National "W" Club.

The first officers of the National "W" Club elected at the 1976 meeting were: Dr. Frank E. Enty, president; Rupert G. Curry, vice president; Herbert B. Thompson, treasurer and Herbert H. Henderson, attorney/secretary.

Attorney Herbert Henderson was assigned the responsibility of acquiring corporate status for the organization. The hard, long, pro-bono legal work of Mr. Henderson gained corporate status for the National "W" Club in 1978. The incorporators were Dr. Frank E. Enty, Rupert Curry, Herbert B. Thompson, William L. Lonesome, and Herbert Henderson.

Washington, DC was selected as the home base for the National "W" Club.


The "W" Club has two chapters. The Institute Chapter and the Shennandoah Chapter which is located in Martinsburg, WV. Both chapters are instrumental in the success of the National "W" Club.

Herbert Thompson wrote the first by-laws for the National "W" Club.

In 1979, at a "W" Club Homecoming meeting, Mr. Glover Smiley proposed the establishing of an Athletic Hall of Fame. It was voted on and passed by the membership. The first Hall of Famers were inducted in 1980. They were: Chester A. Burris; Mark H. Cardwell; Samuel A. Gamble; Vasco D. Hale; Adolph P. Hamblin; Louis R. W. Johnson; Earl Lloyd; Floyd Meadows; Roderick L. Price and Marvin H. Richardson.

Former presidents of the National "W" Club are Dr. Frank Enty, Rupert Curry, Vandy Miller and Madison Broadnax. In 1990, Henry R. Bellinger was elected to the presidency.

On October 13, 1990, the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame, dedicated to Coach Mark H. Cardwell, was opened. This facility located in the Canty House on the campus of West Virginia State College, showcases academic and athletic triumphs of West Virginia State College athletes.

Students whom he taught during his 43 years of service to the college will remember him as a caring and inspiring teacher—one who made the quest for knowledge contagious.

Thousands of West Virginia State College graduates, scattered across the United States will remember him as one of State's most distinguished and ardent supporters. In 1968 he held the first meeting of the Kanawha Valley Alumni Chapter and for 30 years served as its president.

His dedication and hard work were reflected in the goals he set for his chapter and the support given the college through the scholarships and financial contributions to the Erickson Center, the Foundation, and the "W" Club. His dedication and hard work gave new meaning to the words "Alma Mater." His quiet persistence and steadfast leadership made all of us proud to intone the chorus, "Alma Mater, we love you."

Above all else, however, we shall remember Tom as a friend. He was well-known throughout the community and the Kanawha Valley for his kindness and genuine concern for others. He was blessed with a kind heart and he seemed to seek opportunities to promote and serve others. No one can forget his little red truck. It was a veritable symbol of kindness. For he would haul anybody or anything for anyone who needed the service.

And so today, we all remember Tom with reverent joy, grateful that he passed our way.

Charles Ellis


Charles David Ellis was born on March 29, 1946 in Glen Rogers, WV. He is the son of Joseph A. (deceased) and Mary L. Ellis. Charles attended Scott Elementary, Trap Hill High and West Virginia State College.

High school honors include Junior and Senior class president; Captain of the basketball and football teams; voted most athletic; Captain of the All-County team; AA All-State team; Tri-County Scoring Champ in football two consecutive years, scoring 260 points; All-American Honors Coach and Athletes Magazine (running back); All-Tournament basketball team; Track 200, 400 meter; regional record holder for discus 1964.

While at "State", his honors include Men's Senate; campus representative 1966-68; Prillerman Hall counselor; Student Assistant; Physical Education Club; Vash-Na-Ha Fraternity; Dean of Pledges and President of Vash-Na-Ha; All West Virginia Intercollegiate Conference; offensive Team and selected player of the week, football 1969; football captain 1968 and 1969; WVIAC football championship 1968. From 1970-73 he was the assistant football coach at WVSC and Director of the Sullivan Hall Dormitory.

Charles is a member of First Baptist Church of Eccles. He's been a midget league football coach since 1983 and he also coaches track at Roosevelt Junior High School. He is a chaperone and mentor for the Students Taking a Right Stand Club.

Charles is married to Roslyn Major Ellis and is the father of three children and the grandfather of seven.



Perry J. Estep Class of 1980

Perry J. Estep was born on September 3 to Kenneth and Gertie Estep of Nitro, WV.

While attending West Virginia State College, Perry received several awards. They are Honorable Mention All-WVIAC in 1978; WVIAC record 11 assists in 1978; All-Time WVIAC single season batting average leader (.507) in 1979; All-Time WVSC single season batting average leader (.489) in 1979; 5th leading hitter nationally in 1979; All Conference WVIAC-1979; Hitter of the Year - WVIAC-1979;

Perry was drafted his junior year by the Cincinnati Reds and in 1981 was chosen most Popular Player.

He graduated from "State" in 1980 and is currently a teacher in Putnam County. He is also the current football coach for Hurricane Middle School where his team has been undefeated the last 3 years.

He and his wife, Judy, and three children reside in Teays Valley.



Warren Lipscomb


Warren Lipscomb was born in New York City, New York. His family moved from Cumberland, Virginia to Institute, West Virginia in 1943. Warren began his early education at Institute Elementary School. He attended the West Virginia State High School and finished at Dunbar High School.

Warren attended West Virginia State High School where he played baseball and basketball. He attended Dunbar High School after the closing of West Virginia State High School. At Dunbar High School he lettered in Track his junior and senior year. Warren was the first black to letter in track at Dunbar High School. Dunbar High was the West Virginia High School State Track Champions in 1958 and 1959. Warren ran the 440 yard dash, the mile relay and the mile run. He also ran cross country.

Warren also played baseball for Hall of Famer Coach Grant S. Gray in the Pony League.

While at WVSC, he lettered each year in track, one year in swimming, and was Captain of the Track team in his senior year. He was middle distance runner for Hall of Fame Coaches Roderick Price and James C. Wilson. Warren ran the 440 yard dash, 880 yard run, 880 relay, and mile relay every track meet. He held WVIAC Conference and State school records in the 440 yard dash and 880 yard run. He ran on the 880, Sprint Medley, and mile relay teams. Warren ran track with Hall of Famers Michael Gallion, Henry Bellinger and Johnny Gilmore. Warren also swam on the 1960 West Virginia State College WVIAC Swimming Championship team. He swam with Hall of Famer Ronald McLeod. He also swam for Hall of Famer Coaches Chester Burris and James Wilson. He graduated in 1963 with a B.S. Degree in Math with minors in Chemistry and History.

Warren now resides in Durham, North Carolina. He has two children and two grandchildren.



Edgar Randall

Edgar Randall was born and raised in Williamsburg, Virginia. He is a 1975 graduate of York High School where he was a Coaches All-American and All-Peninsula District selection in basketball. He also lettered in baseball.

Edgar came to West Virginia State College in 1975 where he continued his basketball career and garnered Academic All-American, All-Conference honors, and All-Tournament in several tournaments, including the WVIAC Tournament. In 1978, Randall won the Conference Scoring Title. He was a Converse Honorable Mention All-American with the likes of Larry Bird and Magic Johnson. His name is still listed in several categories, including the school's all-time leading free-throw shooter for a season and a career. Also, in 1978, Ed was chosen as "Mr. State." In 1979, he was the "Outstanding Senior Athlete". He also lettered on Coach Art Burris's golf team. In 1980, Randall was selected to play in the Southern California Pro Summer League sponsored by the NBA.

After receiving his B.S. Degree in Physical Education and Safety, he became employed in several positions at "State" with one of his last positions being that of Interim Men's Basketball Coach.

Ed returned to his hometown where he has worked at Williamsburg Christian Academy as a teacher, athletic director, coach, counselor, and assistant administrator.

He is a trustee at New Zion Baptist Church, a member of Groove Phi Groove Social Fellowship, Inc., a member of Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and a former area director of Williamsburg for the Boo Williams Summer League A.A.U. Basketball Program.

He is married to Belinda Fulton Randall, a former "Miss State" (1979) and they are the proud parents of two sons.



Edward Scott, Jr.

Edward Scott, Jr. was born in St. Louis, Missouri where he attended public schools. He was awarded All State honors as a football player.

Ed came to West Virginia State College in 1948 on an athletic scholarship for four years. He was awarded two letters in football, and played on the basketball team for three years. He graduated with a B.S. Degree in Education.

He was commissioned into the U. S. Army as a 2nd Lieutenant and served in the Korean War as an Executive Artillery Officer. He was awarded the Bronze Service Star, United Nations Service Medal and the National Defense Service Medal.

Ed Scott has outstanding credentials for his service to various community organizations: subscribing contributor of WVSC Foundation; former Los Angeles County YMCA board member; Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Scholarship; lifetime state of California teaching certificate for junior colleges and adults.

Also for the past seventeen years, Ed has been secretary of the National "W" Club Association and subscribing toward his third life membership.

He is married and has 6 children and 3 grandchildren.



James Tribble

James (Jimmy) Gregory Tribble was born July 10 in Kanawha County, West Virginia, to James and Louise Tribble. The oldest of five children, Jimmy grew up in Putnam County and graduated from Winfield High School in 1977 where he lettered in varsity football basketball, and baseball. He made the All-Conference football team in 1976 and the All-State baseball team in 1977.

He attended West Virginia State College from 1978-1982 graduating with a B.S. Degree in Secondary Education in 1982. While attending "State," Jimmy played on the baseball team and was a 4 year starter as catcher. He made the All WVIAC baseball team in 1981, 1982; won the WVIAC "hitter of the year" award in 1982; and NAIA All-American baseball team in 1982.

Jimmy became the head baseball coach at Winfield High School from 1983-1993. In 1985, WHS baseball team won the class AA State Baseball Championship with a record of 29-7. Under his coaching, he led teams to win 8 sectional titles and 6 conference championships. He compiled a record of 251 wins and 92 losses during his coaching career.

In 1993 he became involved in private business and today owns and operates his own marketing and distribution business covering over 20 some states.

He currently resides in Winfield with his wife, the former Kama King, and their three children.



Rossman Turpeau, Jr.

Rossman Turpeau, Jr. came to West Virginia State College in 1956 where he was a member of the tennis team until his graduation in 1960 with a B.S. Degree in Physical Education and Health.

While playing tennis at "State," he was a member of the 1959 Championship Tennis Team. His singles and doubles record in 1959 was 24 and 1. He was Captain of the Tennis Team in 1960.

Rossman taught in the Cincinnati Public School system and later became a principal for 18 years.

He is a member of Alpha Phi Alpha and Sigma Pi Phi (Boule) Fraternities and is active in numerous civic and professional organizations.

Mr. Turpeau is now retired and resides with his wife, Evva Friason Turpeau, in Cape Cod. They are the parents of 6 children.

While attending West Virginia State College, Othello was a four year letterman and received several awards for his contribution to the baseball program at "State." In 1978, Othello was named to the All WVIAC District 28 team, All Area 7 (WV, NC, SC, KY) and was recognized as an All-American NAIA (Honorable Mention) As Team Captain, he was again named to the All Area 7 team.

Othello graduated from "State" in 1983 and is currently working for Union Carbide Corp., So. Charleston Plant. He is currently holding the rank of Major in the Army Reserves while performing the duties of Executive Officer of an ordnance Battalion.

Othello resides with his wife, Veronica, in Charleston, WV.


There is a place we love so dear— Its name we'll ever praise and revere 'Tis West Virginia State we love— Just one more step from there is Heav'n above.
