

A Brief History Of The West Virginia State College National "W" Club

On a fall West Virginia Sunday morning in 1975, the day after West Virginia State's Homecoming, a group of West Virginia State College alumni met in a Charleston hotel. The agenda was to brainstorm as to how to raise funds for athletics as well as restore athletics to the status of previous years. The open discussion was chaired by Attorney William Lonesome, an alumnus of the school and a very distinguished leader.

After several hours of discussion, it was decided that a National "W" club would be formed to raise funds for athletic programs. A year later, in 1976, a meeting was held the night before the Homecoming game to formally establish a new National "W" Club.


The first officers of the National "W" Club elected at the 1976 meeting were: Dr. Frank E. Enty, president; Rupert G. Curry, vice president; Herbert B. Thompson, treasurer; and Herbert H. Henderson, attorney/secretary. Attorney Herbert Henderson was assigned the responsibility of acquiring corporate status for the organization. The hard, long, pro-bono legal work of Mr. Henderson gained corporate status for the National "W" Club in 1978. The incorporators were Dr. Frank E. Enty, Rupert Curry, Herbert B. Thompson, William L. Lonesome, and Herbert Henderson. Washington, DC was selected as the home base for the National "W" Club.

The "W" Club has two chapters: the Institute Chapter and the Shennandoah Chapter which is located in Martinsburg, WV. Both chapters are instrumental in the success of the National "W" Club. Herbert Thompson wrote the first by-laws for the National "W" Club.

In 1979, at a "W" Club Homecoming meeting, Mr. Glover Smiley proposed the establishing of an Athletic Hall of Fame. It was voted on and passed by the membership. The first Hall of Famers were inducted in 1980. They were: Chester A. Burris; Mark H. Cardwell; Samuel A. Gamble; Vasco D Hale; Adolph P. Hamblin; Louis R. W. Johnson; Earl Lloyd; Floyd Meadows; Roderick L. Price; and Marvin H. Richardson.

Former presidents of the National "W" Club are Dr. Frank Enty, Rupert Curry, Vandy Miller and Madison Broadnax. In 1990, Henry R. Bellinger was elected to the presidency. The current president is Cornelious "Papa" Jones.

On October 13, 1990, the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame, dedicated to Coach Mark H. Cardwell, was opened. This facility, located in the Canty House on the campus of West Virginia State College, showcases academic and athletic triumphs of West Virginia State College athletes.




MARION L. CUNNINGHAM

Mrs. Marion Lipscomb Cunningham is a native of Institute, WV. After graduating from Dunbar High School, she entered West Virginia State College, where she was an active student-athlete.

Marion, better known to most as "Baby Sister," participated on the cheerleading squad, the men's tennis team, and the swimming team. Baby Sister's love for tennis is what attracted her to the men's tennis team. There was no women's tennis team. Eventually, that interest led to a permanent position on the team. It is believed that she may have been the pioneer that led to Title IX, which required equal support for women as well as men in the area of sports.

Mrs. Cunningham has always been, and is still, very active in her community. She is a teacher for the emotionally disturbed at Kearny High School and the sponsor of several youth organizations.

She is the proud wife of the Rev. Barry Cunningham, who is a licensed psychologist and a native of Institute, WV. Baby Sister has two children, Barry Keith and Cynthia, and a grandchild.




Louis F. Fish

Louis Fish was born on July 1, 1940. His parents, Domenick and Filomena Fish, raised him, along with their nine other children, in the small, coal mining town of Boomer. He graduated from Gauley High School in 1959, where he was captain of the football team and won Special Honorable Mention for the All State Football Team.

He went on to attend college and play football for the West Virginia State College Yellow Jackets. In his position as fullback, he played every game for his four years of college and lettered every year. In the October 1963 game against Anderson, Louis scored the winning touchdown and had 26 carries and 126 yards. Mr. Fish graduated in 1966 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Physical Education and Social Studies Education.

Coach Fish has been a varsity football coach at his Alma Mater, Gauley Bridge High School, for thirty-three years, taking the "Travelers" to two state playoffs. He has been teaching for thirty-seven years and is a member of "Who's Who in America Teaching," being nominated for that position by many students over the years. He has also been recognized by Fayette County Schools for excellence in the classroom.

Louis married his high school sweetheart, Sandra Drake, in 1963. They have three children and one grandchild.




JOHN H. GIST

John graduated from Scott High School in Glen Rodgers, WV in 1942. After graduating from high school, John was drafted and served in the United States Navy from 1943-46. He took boot camp training at the naval base in Great Lakes, IL. His active tour of duty was spent in the Pacific and various ports in Asia.

After his honorable discharge, John enrolled in West Virginia State College in 1946. While in school, he played defensive end for the Yellow Jackets football team for four years, including two appearances in the Capitol Classic in Washington, DC's Griffith Stadium. Following graduation, he joined the Mount Vernon New York Police Department and retired from the force in 1974.

Mr. Gist now resides in St. Petersburg, FL. He is a part-time truck driving instructor with the Pinellas County Board of Education. John has one son, three grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren.



FRANK "TANK" HARRIS


Frank "Tank" Harris was born to William and Susie Harris in Cincinnati, Ohio. He entered West Virginia State College in 1946 and received his Bachelors of Science degree in 1950.

During this period at WVSC, he excelled in football and lettered in each of the four years he attended. As quarter-back for State, in the 1948 and 1949 Capitol Classics in Washington, DC, Frank led the teams to successive victories against Virginia State in '48 and Tennessee State in '49. Additionally, he coached the Barber College's basketball team to four successful seasons in the West Virginia Industrial Leagues. He was considered a player/coach by the players and staff while on the field.

Upon graduation, he became Athletic Director at Hughes High School in Cincinnati. Under his direction, Hughes won four Conference Championships. He was instrumental in sending more than 25 athletes to WVSC. Among these athletes were Taylor Perry (All American) and Virgil Thompson (ALL CIAA and All American).

In service to the City of Cincinnati, Frank was successful in his advocacy of African American officials on all sports venues, which included the areas of junior and senior high football, basketball, track, and baseball. In 1991, he received a Commendation for Exemplary Service from Mayor David S. Mann for his efforts at the Bond Hill Recreation Complex and throughout the City of Cincinnati.

Tank married his college sweetheart, Doris, and to that union were born four children.



Dr. Charles C. Hawkins

Dr. Hawkins received his B. S. degree from Morehouse College in 1930; his M. S. degree from Springfield College in 1932; and his Ph. D. from New York University in 1937. He first came to West Virginia State College in 1932 and taught until 1935. He returned to Institute in 1945 as the Chairperson of the Department of Health, Physical Education, and Safety and the Director of Athletics.

One of Dr. Hawkins' major accomplishments was assisting in the change of WVSC from a predominately black institution to the fully integrated school that it is today. This included the integration of the coaching staff, as well as all of the sports at the college. He promoted the idea of comradery both on and off the field. He was an innovator and an individual who believed in the transition of West Virginia State College.

On December 1, 1973, Dr. Hawkins received the West Virginia State College Health and Physical Education Association Recognition Award for his many years of service providing guidance towards the advancement of the goals of the profession. At his final commencement on May 18, 1974, special honors were conferred on him for his long and distinguished service to the College.



BEN A. HUNTER


Ben A. Hunter was born on May 30, 1947 in Greenville, NC to Arthur (deceased) and Sarah Hunter. He attended Wilbur Cross High School in New Haven, CT, where he was on the All District and All Tournament teams. He transferred to Bruton Heights High School in Williamsburg, VA, where he graduated in 1965. He was all County and made the All Tournament Team in basketball.

Mr. Hunter matriculated at West Virginia State College, where he was a four-year starter in basketball and is still the third leading rebounder. "Big Ben" was on the WVIAC All Tournament in 1969. He also played tennis and scored the only point in the WVIAC tournament in 1968. In 1969, he graduated with a B. S. degree in political science and a minor in psychology and philosophy.

Coach Hunter was an assistant football coach at Hillhouse High School, where his football team went 13-0 in 1985 and won the state championship.

He has received Distinguished Service Awards for the New Haven Police Department, AKA Sorority, Southern Connecticut State University, Dixwell Community House, Coca-Cola Basketball Tournament, Hillhouse High School Class of 1991, and Groove Phi Groove Social Fraternity.

Mr. Hunter resides in New Haven, where he is an Associate Principal at Hillhouse High School. He is a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, the NAACP, and Dixwell Congregational Church.



JOSEPH G. WATSON, SR.

The University of South Carolina had heavily recruited Joe since he hails from South Carolina, but the best school grabbed him. In 1961, he became a Yellow Jacket.

He was remarkably adept at playing various basketball positions with equal skill, a phenomenon that was not so prevalent among his peers during that era. Importantly, he was also gifted in so many facets of the game that his team mates often marveled at his command of the sport.

During Mr. Watson's athletic tenure at WVSC, he lettered for four years. For two of those years, he was named team captain. He made the WVIAC Conference All Tournament team in the 1964-65 season. While a member of the Yellow Jackets, he led the team in scoring in the 1963-64 and 1964-65 seasons. He was the WVSC Sportsman of the Year in 1963 and among the team leaders during the 1961-65 period. Joe was a member of the WVSC team that was runner-up for the conference Championship in 1961. In 1962, he was a major contributor to State's Playoff Conference Championship team. In each instance, Joe Watson was a stellar performer for the team, which went on to represent the conference at the NAIA Championship series.

To cap an outstanding athletic career, he was nominated in 1965 as an Honorable Mention NAIA All American. He went on to play professionally in the Industrial Basketball League as a member of the Cleveland Airomatics. He was team co-captain and starting guard in 1967 and 1968 and one of the leading scorers in the league during that time.

Joe is a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and currently resides in South Carolina. He is embarking upon service in the field of theology. Joe Watson is the father of four children and a devoted family man.
