

A Brief History Of The West Virginia State College National "W" Club

On a fall West Virginia Sunday morning in 1975, the day after West Virginia State's Homecoming, a group of West Virginia State College alumni met in a Charleston hotel. The agenda was to brainstorm as to how to raise funds for athletics as well as restore athletics to the status of previous years. The open discussion was chaired by Attorney William Lonesome, an alumnus of the school and a very distinguished leader.

After several hours of discussion, it was decided that a National "W" club would be formed to raise funds for athletic programs.

A year later, in 1976, a meeting was held the night before the Homecoming game to formally establish a new National "W" Club.

The first officers of the National "W" Club elected at the 1976 meeting were: Dr. Frank E. Enty, president; Rupert G. Curry, vice president; Herbert B. Thompson, treasurer; and Herbert H. Henderson, attorney/secretary.

Attorney Herbert Henderson was assigned the responsibility of acquiring corporate status for the organization. The hard, long, pro-bono legal work of Mr. Henderson gained corporate status for the National "W" Club in 1978. The incorporators were Dr. Frank E. Enty, Rupert Curry, Herbert B. Thompson, William L. Lonesome, and Herbert Henderson.

Washington, DC was selected as the home base for the National "W" Club. The "W" Club has two chapters: the Institute Chapter and the Shennandoah Chapter, which is located in Martinsburg, WV. Both chapters are instrumental in the success of the National "W" Club. Herbert Thompson wrote the first by-laws for the National "W" Club.

In 1979, at a "W" Club Homecoming meeting, Mr. Glover Smiley proposed the establishing of an Athletic Hall of Fame. It was voted on and passed by the membership. The first Hall of Famers were inducted in 1980. They were: Chester A. Burris; Mark H. Cardwell; Samuel A. Gamble; Vasco D Hale; Adolph P. Hamblin; Louis R. W. Johnson; Earl Lloyd; Floyd Meadows; Roderick L. Price; and Marvin H. Richardson.

Former presidents of the National "W" Club are Dr. Frank Enty, Rupert Curry, Vandy Miller and Madison Broadnax. In 1990, Henry R. Bellinger was elected to the presidency. The current president is Cornelious "Papa" Jones.

On October 13, 1990, the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame, dedicated to Coach Mark H. Cardwell, was opened. This facility, located in the Canty House on the campus of West Virginia State College, showcases academic and athletic triumphs of West Virginia State College athletes.



RICHARD ALLEN BECKNER, SR. CLASS OF 1972

Born July 6, 1950, Richard Allen Beckner Sr., a son of Belva Marie (King) Beckner and the late Andrew Berthel Beckner, graduated from Poca High School in 1968. That year, Richard won the West Virginia state title in the pole vault, breaking the WVSSAC record in the process. Richard enrolled at West Virginia State College in the fall of '68, joining the track and field team and beginning a string of four-straight WVIAC pole vault titles. He set the WVIAC mark in his freshman season of 1969 and broke his own record the following two years.

Perhaps most impressively, Richard never lost a WVIAC pole vault competition, an unbeaten mark that spanned four years. In addition, his conference record set in 1971 stood until the early 1990's. His WVSC mark has never been topped. Along with four other members of the 1971 Yellow Jacket track team, Richard qualified for the NAIA National Track and Field Championships in Billings, Montana. At the meet, he was a national title finalist. From 1969-72, Richard was a member of four straight WVIAC track titles for the Yellow Jackets. Of all his personal accomplishments, it is of the team awards Richard says he's most proud.

When his sons began pole vault competition in the early 1990's, Richard returned to competition on the Master's circuit and set regional records in the pole vault and won the gold meal at the Mountain State Games in Huntington, WV in 1992.

Richard holds membership on the WVSC Track Committee; is a Sunday School teacher at Bancroft Church of God Mission; volunteer and counselor at church youth camps in addition to assisting in the construction of the Upward Way Church Camp; official at junior and senior high track meets in WV; and acted as pole vault coach to athletes at Poca High School.

Richard has been married to Angela Lynn (Gibson) Beckner since 1972 and is the father of Richard Allen Beckner, Jr., and Andrew Joseph Beckner. Richard and Angie currently have one grandchild, Jaymeson Beckner, and anxiously wait for more. Richard's love and devotion for his family is exceeded only by his love for his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.



DWAYNE FREEMAN CLASS OF 1970

Dwayne "Scooter" Freeman is the youngest of two sons born to Alfred and Viola Freeman in Williamsburg, Virginia. Dwayne was a super three sports person at Bruton Heights High School in Williamsburg, Virginia, and was All Conference and All District for two years in football and basketball.

After graduating from Burton Heights High School in 1966, he came to West Virginia State College, where he excelled in basketball. While at State, Scooter held several honors. He led his team in Take Aways two times; was Defensive Player of the Week two times. Other honors included: leading freshman scorer with a 15 point average per game; selected to the WVIAC in 1967 and 1968; leading freshman rebounder with six rebounds per game; chosen to All Tournament teams eight times; and third leading percentage shooter in the nation in small colleges. In 1968, he was one of the team's leading scorers, and the Yellow Jackets led the nation in scoring. Scooter also earned three varsity letters in basketball and was selected to the All Tournament team during his sophomore, junior, and senior years.

Scooter resides in Portsmouth, Virginia. Prior to assuming his current position, he was the coach of the Midnite Men's Basketball team, which went to the national championship in 1998, 1999, and 2001. He is employed as Director of Physical Education and Health at the Southside Boys and Girls Club in Norfolk, Virginia He has a daughter, Diane Freeman, who resides in Flint, Michigan.



LIEUTENANT COLONEL (RET.) THOMAS LEE JONES CLASS OF 1974

Lieutenant Colonel (Lt. Col., Retired) Thomas Lee Jones is a native of Cleveland, Ohio. He graduated from Pemberton Township High School (NJ) in 1970. He enrolled at West Virginia State College, where he majored in Political Science. In 2002, he received a Masters of Science in Administration from Central Michigan University.

While at WVSC, he was a member of the Senior Reserved Officers' Training Corp and participated on the college's track teams. His events included the two-mile relay, one-mile relay, 440 yard relay, spring medley relay, and 440 yard dash. He also ran the 880 yard dash in under one minute and fifty-five seconds and the 440 yard dash in under forty-nine seconds, both of which were outstanding times during his era. As a sophomore, he served as the team's co-captain and also was a member of the All Conference track team in 1973-74. He was Senior Class President in 1974.

In 1974, after receiving his Bachelor of Arts degree, Lt. Col. Jones was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry, United States Army, from State. He faithfully devoted over 20 years of service, which included 4 tours to Korea. During his military service, Lt. Col. Jones received numerous medals and awards, including the Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal, the Army Achievement Medal, and the Army Commendation Medal.

Lt. Col. Jones has been involved in various community, civic, and religious activities and has been recognized for his contributions. Other honors include: 2002 Inductee into the Pemberton Township School District Hall of Fame; Who's Who Among America's Teachers (2002); and 2002 Student-Teacher Achievement Recognition (STAR) recipient.

Lt. Col. Jones and his wife, Constance, are the proud parents of two. Alexis is a third year student at Case Western Reserve University and Marcel, is a second year student at Columbus State University.



RONNIE J. LEGETTE, SR. CLASS OF 1987

Ron Legette was an outstanding athlete and a star basketball player for the Yellow Jackets. In 1987, he was named "Most Valuable Player" by the WVIAC, and he was a member of the All Conference Team. During his first year on the team, he was named "Player of the Week" for three weeks, and in his senior year, he served as the team's cocaptain. One of his most memorable games was when WVSC played Bluefield State; Ron scored 50 points and had 15 assists.

Ron currently is employed by University Hospital in New York, where he serves as the Assistant Director of Environmental Services. Additionally, he often works as a business and government consultant. His hobbies are sports and landscaping. In his spare time, he is a volunteer basketball coach for Donnie Fielder Memorial Basketball Tournament, and he is the co-founder of the Syracuse Grass Root Movement Organization. Ron is also active in his church and is the chair of the Trustee Board at Mt. Pleasant Missionary Baptist Church.

Prior to assuming his current position, Ron was employed with the Syracuse Parks and Recreation Department; was a real estate agent selling low to moderate income housing; was Deputy Commissioner for the Department of Public Works in NY; and for five years operated his own business, Legette's Cleaning Company.

Ron holds the B.S. Degree in Business Administration from West Virginia State College. He resides in Syracuse, New York with his wife of 16 years, Pamela, and their four children —Candace, Chaz, Ronnie, and Lamar.



WILLIAM W. "BILLY" LIPSCOMB CLASS OF 1975

The fourth son born to the late W. T. and Marion Lipscomb in Institute, WV, Billy, affectionately called "#4" by his mother, is a life-long resident of Institute. His father was employed at the Union Carbide Institute Plant, and his mother was employed at West Virginia State College. Both parents were instrumental in supporting their children educationally and athletically. When Billy was in high school, the sports writers dubbed the Lipscomb family as "A Track Family Supreme" because of the accomplishments of the older brothers and sister. They had won championships and were school, conference, state, national, and world record holders in track.

Billy was recruited to State by A. L. "Buck" Dawson, and was awarded Coach Dawson's first track scholarship. Coach Dawson selected him to be captain of the track team during his freshman year and stated "he became the catalyst for my recruiting track athletes to form the team that would allow us to dominate the WVIAC for several years. Much of the credit for State's rise in track must be given to Billy." While at State, Billy was a member of four WVIAC team championships; won four WVIAC individual championships; selected four times All Conference in the WVIAC; and set three WVIAC conference records. Billy was chosen "Trackman of the Year," his highest honor, by the conference coaches. He is proud to say that he was the first recipient of that award. Billy qualified twice for the NAIA championships, and for two years in a row, the Mile Relay team was the fastest in the state of West Virginia (being four tenths of a second off the stadium record at Ohio State Relays). Billy was selected Who's Who Among Colleges and Universities for Track and Field.

Billy is very involved in his community. He is a mentor in Kanawha Valley schools; Kanawha Valley Men of Integrity steering committee; Deacon at Harvest Fire Church and Tabernacle of Praise Fellowship of Churches; and was a deejay for WEYS Radio, founded by his brother, Robert. Billy remains active with his alma mater. He is a member of the W-Club and helped establish the W-Club Track Committee and the A. L. Dawson/Glover Smiley Track Fund. He is fulfilling a life long dream at WVSC helping to coach track.

Billy married his high school sweetheart, Debra Chandler, and they are the proud parents of William, father of Julius and Jeremiah; and Krista, mother of one on the way, the first granddaughter, Ameris. Both of his children and their spouses are WVSC alumni. He is the **fourth** son, the **fourth** sports inductee in the family, on the **fourth** day of October. Billy takes much pride in being able to join his brothers and sister in the WVSC Sports Hall of Fame. Can't you see his mother smiling for #4?
