


A Salute to Our President

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE WEST VIRGINIA STATE UNIVERSITY NATIONAL "W" CLUB

On a fall West Virginia Sunday morning in 1975, the day after West Virginia State's Homecoming, a group of West Virginia State College alumni met in a Charleston, West Virginia hotel. The agenda was to brainstorm as to how to raise funds for athletics as well as restore athletics to the status of previous years. The open discussion was chaired by Attorney William Lonesome, an alumnus of the school and a very distinguished leader.

After several hours of discussion, it was decided that a National "W" club would be formed to raise funds for athletic programs.

A year later, in 1976, a meeting was held the night before the Homecoming game to formally establish a new National "W" Club.

The first officers of the National "W" Club elected at the 1976 meeting were: Dr. Frank E. Enty, president; Rupert G. Curry, vice president; Herbert B. Thompson, treasurer, and Herbert H. Henderson, attorney/secretary.

Attorney Herbert Henderson was assigned the responsibility of acquiring corporate status for the organization. The hard, long, pro-bono legal work of Mr. Henderson gained corporate status for the National "W" Club in 1978. The incorporators were Dr. Frank E. Enty, Rupert Curry, Herbert B. Thompson, William L. Lonesome, and Herbert Henderson.

Washington, DC was selected as the home base for the National "W" Club.

The "W" Club has two chapters, the Institute Chapter and the Shennandoah Chapter which is located in Martinsburg, WV. Both chapters are instrumental in the success of the National "W" Club.

Herbert Thompson wrote the first by-laws for the National "W" Club.

In 1979, at a "W" Club Homecoming meeting, Mr. Glover Smiley proposed the establishing of an Athletic Hall of Fame. It was voted on and passed by the membership. The first Hall of Famers were inducted in 1980. They were Chester A. Burris; Mark H. Cardwell; Samuel A. Gamble; Vasco D. Hale; Adolph P. Hamblin; Louis R. W. Johnson; Earl Lloyd; Floyd Meadows; Roderick L. Price, and Marvin H. Richardson.

Past presidents of the National "W" Club are Dr. Frank Enty, Rupert Curry, Vandy Miller, Madison Broadnax, Henry R. Bellinger, and Cornelious "Papa" Jones. William Lipscomb was elected president in 2008.

The WVSC Sports Hall of Fame, located in the Canty House on the campus was dedicated to Mark H. Cardwell, Sr. on October 13, 1990. This facility showcases academic and athletic triumphs of West Virginia State College athletes.

A special note of thanks to President Carter for officially designating the Canty House as headquarters for the WVSU National "W" Club.



MARSHALL L. BERGER Class of 1977

FOOTBALL

WVIAC Player of the Week All-WVIAC Defensive Team - 1976 Team Co-Captain 1976

Marshall L. Berger, a native of Martinsville, VA, was recruited by West Virginia State College (WVSC) to play football in 1973.

During Marshall's four years at WVSC, he was a three year letterman. He led the team in sacks for two years. He was also among team leaders in tackles. Marshall was named WVIAC Player of Week numerous times throughout his career. Marshall collected a total of 16 tackles, one block punt and a partially blocked punt in addition to "throwing" the quarterback for two key losses during an upset over undefeated Fairmont State College. He was named to the All-West Virginia Conference Defensive Team in 1976. Other notable contributions included the WVSC record in long jump.

In 1976, he was voted by his teammates as team co-captain. Marshall was described by Coach Cameron as a "quiet, steady type of leader" who was a "leader by ability." His talent as a defensive end was described as "spectacular fashion" following a game against Glenville State College in which he scored two touchdowns. Coach Cameron was also quoted as saying Marshall "will probably be the senior toughest to replace. At defensive end, I've seen no one better." In 1978 he signed with the WV Rockets of the American Football Association (AFL).

Marshall continued his leadership off the field, currently serving as Director of the James H. "Tiger" Morton Juvenile Center in Dunbar, WV. He has worked in the juvenile correction system for 34 years. Marshall is the founder of the Juvenile Detention Prevention Program. He extended the Detention Prevention Program to include all of the middle schools in the Kanawha Valley and the Upward Bound Program at WV State University. He is a member of the National Juvenile Detention Association and the American Correction Education. Marshall has also served the community by coaching biddy basketball and softball and volunteering for Special Olympics.

Marshall is married to Florence Berger (Woodson). He has 2 daughters, Nakia Berger and Kim Woodson-Hall, one son, Tommy Woodson-Hall. He also has a grandson, Lyric.


All WVIAC Linebacker 1984 WVIAC Best Defensive Player 1987 WVIAC Leading Tackler for 4 Straight Years Team Captain 1984-1988

Charles "Pat" Clark, the son of Carlos and Vivian Clark of Yawkey, West Virginia, entered West Virginia State College in the fall of 1984. Pat is a graduate of Duval High School in Griffithsville, WV, where he participated in football, track & field, baseball, and basketball. He was an All-State and All-Conference linebacker-fullback in football and qualified for the state track meet in the 100 yard dash. Pat was listed in the Street & Smiths All-American magazine for his performance in high school and as a top college prospect in football. He was recruited by West Virginia University, Virginia Tech, and a number of other Division I universities, but he accepted the opportunity to play football for the West Virginia State Yellow Jackets.

Pat was an All-Conference linebacker in the WVIAC and a standout of the 1984 WVSC football team, a team that is referred to frequently as one of the best in the history of WV State football. He was a 1988 selection to Who's Who among Students in American Universities & Colleges and he was also recognized by the local "W" Club for his athletic achievements in football. He led the WV Conference with 521 career tackles and set a WVSC individual tackling record. Pat was named the Best Defensive Player in 1987 in the WVIAC and was the leading tackler for the Conference for 4 straight years.

A four-year starter and four-year captain of the team, Pat graduated with a B.S. in Health, Safety, and Physical Education in 1988. He went on to Marshall University where he received his M.S. in Safety Management in 1990. His time away from work is spent coaching high school football and youth sports.

Pat resides in Scott Depot, WV with his wife, Robin, and sons Joshua (16) and Jordan (12).

WVIAC Swimming and Diving Team Championship for the first time in school history Team Elected to the WVSC All Academic Team every year of competition

James E. Cullop was born in Elkridge, WV and graduated from Montgomery High School in 1953. He enrolled at West Virginia State College in the fall of 1959 with the help of Coach Art Burris. In 1960 WVSC won the WVIAC Swimming and Diving Championship for the first time in school history. The team also competed in the NAIA swimming championship in Detroit, Michigan. This swimming team was elected to the WVSC All Academic Team every year of competition. His most feared and favorite professor was Dr. Barbara Oden who taught him that athletics was fine, but academics would pay the bills.

Mr. Cullop retired in 2002 after 32 years of a very successful career in insurance. He currently resides in Ocala, Florida.



EDWARD "MAGOO" DAVIS, JR. Class of 1970

BASKETBALL WVIAC Player of the Week

Ed Davis was born in the Letroit Park area of Washington, D.C. to Edward and Ann Davis. Before attending West Virginia State College, he graduated from the basketball powerhouse Dunbar High School. During his tenure at Dunbar he played forward and this team defeated nationally ranked Cardinal-Gibbons of Baltimore. Davis was also very active in the community, attending the historic Florida Avenue Baptist Church and working with the D.C. Department of Recreation.

After receiving several scholarship offers, he chose WVSC. At State Ed became known as "Magoo" a name that would follow him through the rest of his life. He was blessed to play with an outstanding cast of players that set scoring records in the NCAA and NAIA polls. Ed averaged about 11 points and 8 rebounds per game. The highlight of his career came when he was named "Player of the Week" after scoring 24 points against Glenville State. Ed finished West Virginia State in 4 years with a B.S. in Education.

After WVSC, he obtained his M.S. in Education Administration and his Advanced Certificate of Graduate Studies in Educational Technology and Learning Systems. Later he taught and coached in the D.C. and Montgomery Public School system for 28 years.

After 16 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Ed Davis has a 312-154 overall record. His tenure is highlighted with several championships and numerous "coach of the year" awards.

Dr. Gregory D. Epps, Sr. is the Executive Assistant to the President at West Virginia State University (WVSU). Previous positions at "State" include Special Assistant to the President; Assistant Vice President for Administrative Services; and Director of the Enhanced Skills Training Program.

Dr. Epps received a B.S. degree in Education from WVSU; a Masters in Public Administration/ Management from Marshall University; and a Doctorate in Education Administration from West Virginia University. He also is a graduate of the Business Management Institute at Cornell University, the College Management Institute at the University of Kentucky, and the Executive Leadership Program at Hampton University.

While a student at WVSC, Dr. Epps excelled as a member of the track team. His honors include: team captain for 2 years and co-captain 1 year; letterman for 4 years; All WVIAC conference for 4 years and 5 All conference awards; conference team champions 1 year and conference team runner up 2 years; WVSU records in the 440, 400, mile, and 1600 relays; conference records in the 400 and 1600 relays; runner-up champion in the 400 meter dash; and consistent top finisher in the 200 and 400 meter dashes in conference championships. He also was a 1-year letterman and co-captain of the cross country team and served as an assistant coach of the 1981 conference champion track team.

Dr. Epps was recently inducted into the Sports and Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame at St. Albans High School where he participated in football and track. He is a member of the All Nations Revival Center where he serves on the Deacon, Trustee and Minister Boards. He is also a member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

Dr. Epps is a native of St. Albans, WV. He is the son of Don and Lola Epps. He and his wife, Kisstaman, are the proud parents of four children: Tionna, Talana, Tazanna, and Gregory, Jr.

Baseball Team Captain All-Conference Baseball Player Batting Average .360

Mr. Goff was first recognized for excellence with four years of sustained performance in his senior year at West Virginia State College for two sports. The Citation of Outstanding Athletic Achievements in Football and Baseball was issued during his senior year. The Citation read as follows "Outstanding Student, Citizen, Athlete, and Gentleman." This Citation was signed by Coach Grant Gray, Dean Harrison Ferrell, and President William J. L. Wallace. He was also the Captain of the 1959-60 baseball team and was All-Conference Baseball Player for having a batting average of .360.

This quality and high standard continued after graduation by assisting in raising money for the college, recruiting, and serving as an ambassador for WVSC. His career was manifested by being an affiliate of the Pittsburgh Pirate baseball farm system. A professional career was just as impressive by serving as a teacher, football, basketball, and baseball coach, served with honors in the U. S. Army, was Director of The Department of Employment Services for Washington, D. C. under three mayors. He also served as Superintendent of Crispus Attucks Youth Build Charter School. Community Service Awards are too many to list but these are some examples: The Humanitarian Award; Who's Who in Government Services; Honor Graduate in his Military Police Academy Class; and the Ethiopian/Indochinese Community Service Award. Most of all, he has kept God first in his life.





John joined the U. S. Navy in 1976 and held the rank of Third Class Petty Officer in the Aviation field and received an honorable discharge in 1982. John served three years active duty and two years of active reserve and one year inactive reserve.

John attended West Virginia State College from 1982-84 where he participated in track and football. He assisted in leading the track team to conference championships in 1982 and 1983. John was the conference champion in the 200 meter dash and the 100 meter dash, and also ran first leg on both the 4x100 meter relay and 800 meter relay, where WVSC won both Conference relays. John participated in the NAIA College Track and Field Championship and was ranked in the top ten in the nation in the 100 meter dash and 200 meter dash at Charleston, West Virginia.

Four Winning Seasons Built the Yellow Jackets into the West Virginia Conference Southern Division Champions NAIA Hall of Fame AFCA Board of Trustees Johnny Vaught Lifetime Achievement Award Citation of Honor NYSP Activity Director

Coach Oree Banks came to West Virginia State in 1977 after having coached at Coahoma Community College in Mississippi and South Carolina State. Previously, he was the assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin, Grambling State University, University of South Carolina, and University of Virginia.

In the seven years as the Head Football Coach at "State", Banks had four winning seasons and compiled a record of 32-36-1. In three years, Banks built the Yellow Jackets into the West Virginia Conference Southern Division Champions and earned a berth in the Coal Bowl. He was the recipient of many awards during his career at WVSC. He was appointed to the AFCA Board of Trustees, (the first in the state of West Virginia); Johnny Vaught Lifetime Achievement Award from All-American Football Foundation; instrumental in establishing the Trailblazer Award for AFCA; Citation of Honor from the Football Writers Association of America for his long and honorable career in college athletics and his contributions to football; and started a weekly radio show on WCHS.

In January of 1995, Oree Banks' career reached its peak when he was inducted into the NAIA National Hall of Fame in the Coach Category in Dallas, TX. Coach Banks also is a lecturer regarding drug education, traveling the country speaking to students about drug awareness. Professional consulting is also provided by his daughter and son – Sandra, B.S., The Ohio State University; M.D., University of Pittsburgh; Residency in Emergency Medicine, George Washington University and O. Michael – B.S. Chemistry, Yale University; M.B.A., Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Banks has served 14 years as Activity Director for the National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) and has published two books *Trailblazers from Black Colleges to the NFL* and *Learn Football Coaching from Legends Eddie Robinson and Paul Dietzel*.

His personal goal to reach more and more of those who need to hear his message might have been summed up best by the Charleston Gazette newspaper when in the final paragraph of an editorial opinion, it said simply, "Any coach who puts a quarterback's grades above a Saturday gridiron victory deserves to be in a Hall of Fame."



WALTER M. WILKERSON, SR. Class of 1974

Only President of "W" Club Since 1978 Athletic Hall of Fame Committee

Walter M. Wilkerson, Sr., was born the third child of six to Walter E. (WVSC '34), and Margaret B. Wilkerson (WVSC '35) in Welch, WV on March 1, 1945. His siblings are Lauretha (WVSC '60); Danny (Lincoln Univ, '63); Ronnie (WVU '72); Belinda (WVSC '80); and Lloyd (WVSC '73).

After graduation from Gary District High School in 1963, he enrolled at West Virginia State College while working full-time at FMC and later Union Carbide. He received a B.S. degree in Math in 1974. In 1989, Walter was presented an award for his proposal to Carbide that saved over \$100,000 a year in recurring cost reductions.

Walt Wilkerson has spent many years volunteering with children in teaching, coaching, and math tutoring. He has worked with the Local Sub-Area Planning Committee and received the Community Service and Volunteer Award in 1992.

The majority of his volunteer hours have been working for the "W" Club. Walt worked closely with Alumni Affairs Director Fred Bailey, and Athletic Director, Robert Maxwell who were both instrumental in setting up all programs for the "W" Club in 1978, of which he had been the only president. In 1979, Walter served on the Athletic Hall of Fame Committee. The first Hall of Famers were inducted in 1980. Walter was also instrumental in the Athletic Department being able to purchase a 54-seat bus.

Many of Walter's accomplishments and achievements would not have been possible had it not been for the encouragement from Dr. Andrew Aheart telling him to stay involved; Nellie Walker who kept him on track in school; and Warren Lipscomb, and J. W. Spencer who pushed him and never would let him quit the "W" Club team.

Walter is retired from Union Carbide with 25 years, currently has 20 years with Mallory Realtors Association, and is a member of St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church. He is married to Fatiema Strawther Wilson Wilkerson (WVSU '95). He has two children, Nada (Jim) Gray (WVU '93), and Maurice, Jr., (Sarah) (WVSU '99), and two step-children, Dionne and Barbara Wilson (Clayton State Univ. '07). He also has three grandchildren, Jasmyne, Lydia, and Audrey; and two step-grandchildren, Alexis and Dakota.

Jeff C. Woods was born in Lewisburg, WV on March 28, 1954. He graduated from West Virginia State College with a degree in Sociology, Magna Cum Laude, in 1975. He was designated a "Distinguished Military Student and Graduate," and commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army. He studied Counseling and Guidance at West Virginia College of Graduate Studies. He received a Juris Doctorate, Magna Cum Laude, from Howard University Law School in 1979. He was Case Notes Editor of the Howard Law Journal.

Mr. Woods served as a clerk with the WV Supreme Court of Appeals and Acting Director of the WV Magistrate Court System. He is in the U. S. Army Judge Advocate General's Corps as a prosecutor and "Senior Trial Counsel" with the Fifth Infantry Division at Ft. Polk, Louisiana. He graduated from the Advanced Officers' Graduate Course, Judge Advocate General's School and was promoted to the rank of Major. Following his release from the military, he joined Jackson Kelly. He retired from that firm after twenty-five years of successful litigation practice. He currently maintains a private law practice.

Upon his return to West Virginia, Mr. Woods dedicated himself to serving his beloved Alma Mater. In addition to teaching and being a member of the Board of Advisors and the University Foundation, he served on various selection and planning committees. His dedication to "State" is demonstrated by the fact he was an adjunct faculty member for fifteen years and donated his salary to the University. In addition to raising funds for various sports teams, he was a football game commentator for seven seasons. During his first year as head coach, Earl Monroe designated Jeff, who is the Pastor of the Church of Christian Faith in Charleston, as the Chaplain for the football team. His service to the team and his motivational pre-game chapel messages has earned him the respect of the players who respectfully call him "Rev." The number of players who attend chapel is impressive. Jeff's sense of humor and ability to keep programs on schedule makes him a popular choice as a Master of Ceremonies. For the last ten years, he has served as the Master of Ceremonies for the WVSU Sports Hall of Fame.

Jeff is the extremely proud father of two children Christie and Jennifer Woods, a physician and teacher, respectively. He is married to Pattie Woods.

He has served on various committees of the State Bar as a lecturer at legal seminars and a Military Analyst for CBS National Radio. His awards include inductions into Greenbrier East High School and West Virginia State University ROTC Halls of Fame. Jeff firmly believes God has challenged him to leave this world a little better than it was before he was born. His life of service shows he places God above all things.


