

- Master's degrees established M.A. - Media Studies M.A., M.S. - Biotechnology;





A Brief History of the West Virginia State University National "W" Club

On a fall West Virginia Sunday morning in 1975, the day after West Virginia State's Homecoming, a group of West Virginia State College alumni met in a Charleston, West Virginia hotel. The agenda was to brainstorm as to how to raise funds for athletics as well as restore athletics to the status of previous years. The open discussion was chaired by Attorney William Lonesome, an alumnus of the school and a very distinguished leader.

After several hours of discussion, it was decided that a National "W" club would be formed to raise funds for athletic programs.

A year later, in 1976, a meeting was held the night before the Homecoming game to formally establish a new National "W" Club.

The first officers of the National "W" Club elected at the 1976 meeting were: Dr. Frank E. Enty, president; Rupert G. Curry, vice president; Herbert B. Thompson, treasurer, and Herbert H. Henderson, attorney/secretary.

Attorney Herbert Henderson was assigned the responsibility of acquiring corporate status for the organization. The hard, long, pro-bono legal work of Mr. Henderson gained corporate status for the National "W" Club in 1978. The incorporators were Dr. Frank E. Enty, Rupert Curry, Herbert B. Thompson, William L. Lonesome, and Herbert Henderson.

Washington, DC was selected as the home base for the National "W" Club.

The "W" Club has two chapters, the Institute Chapter and the Shennandoah Chapter which is located in Martinsburg, WV. Both chapters are instrumental in the success of the National "W" Club.

Herbert Thompson wrote the first by-laws for the National "W" Club.

In 1979, at a "W" Club Homecoming meeting, Mr. Glover Smiley proposed the establishing of an Athletic Hall of Fame. It was voted on and passed by the membership. The first Hall of Famers were inducted in 1980. They were Chester A. Burris; Mark H. Cardwell; Samuel A. Gamble; Vasco D. Hale; Adolph P. Hamblin; Louis R. W. Johnson; Earl Lloyd; Floyd Meadows; Roderick L. Price, and Marvin H. Richardson.

Past presidents of the National "W" Club are Dr. Frank Enty, Rupert Curry, Vandy Miller, Madison Broadnax, Henry R. Bellinger, and Cornelious "Papa" Jones. William Lipscomb was elected president in 2008.

The WVSU Sports Hall of Fame, located in the Canty House on the campus was dedicated to Mark H. Cardwell, Sr. on October 13, 1990. This facility showcases academic and athletic triumphs of West Virginia State University athletes.

A special note of thanks to President Carter for officially designating the Canty House as headquarters for the WVSU National "W" Club.



FOOTBALL and BASEBALL



James Charley was born on June 26, 1954, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania to Henry and Verdell Charley, both of whom are watching from heaven. He graduated from Westinghouse High School, where he lettered in football, baseball and volleyball.

After enrolling at West Virginia State (University) in the fall of 1972, Jim decided to watch the football team practice. He walked on and began to practice with the team but, only with the defense as a safety and cornerback. During his sophomore season, the coaches suggested he try the position of quarterback in the last 2 games. Jim never missed another start and loved every minute of his playing time.

As a junior, he played baseball and earned the starting position at second base, contributing to "State" winning the Southern Division of the WVIAC that year. Jim finished 3rd in the conference with a batting average of .368, and was selected to the All-WVIAC first team at 2nd base.

Jim met his wife Vicky Brooks while attending "State". They are the proud parents of daughter Tori and son Ryan.

Wilbert Goff was born in Leslie, WV, third child of the late Samuel and Florence Goff. He attended Bolling and Crichton High Schools and became the first African American student to participate in integrated sports in Greenbrier County, earning All State honors in football and basketball.


Hall of Famer, Wesley Lynch recruited Wilbert to play for WVSC (University) in 1959, where he became a stand out hitter and pitcher on Coach Grant Gray's baseball team. He had a career 15-4 record, ERA of 2.38, double digit strikeouts and pitching a perfect game. His passion for baseball resulted in Major League tryouts with the Milwaukee Braves and the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Wilbert also lettered 2 years as the starting quarterback under Coach Chester Burris's football team. He was known for his outstanding passes which contributed to the success of the WVSC (University) football team.

Wilbert was among the first graduating class from the Federal City College in Washington, D.C., graduating with honors in 1970.

He has received many honors as a catcher in the American Softball Association Major Division in the Washington, D.C. Metro area, including the Greater Metropolitan Washington Fast Pitch Hall of Fame Commissioner's Outstanding Male Award in 1978.

After 40 years with the Washington, D.C Board of Parole, Wilbert and his wife are very much involved in their church. They are the proud parents of one daughter, Karen and love spending time with granddaughter Antoinette.



THOMAS D. GOODWIN Class of 1962


BASKETBALL Lettered in Basketball 1959-61 Co-Captian of 1961 Basketball Team

Thomas D. Goodwin "Goody" to some and "DC" to others, was born in Columbia, South Carolina to Thomas and Dorothy Goodwin. He and his family moved to Washington, DC where he attended public schools and later graduated from Paul Laurence Dunbar High School in 1957, where he played 3 years of tennis and basketball. He also enjoyed being a member of the marching band. Thomas enlisted in the United States Army during his junior year of high school, thereby obligating himself to serve 6 months of active duty after graduating.

"Goody" enrolled in WVSC (University) in 1958 and was a three year letterman for Coach Mark Cardwell's basketball team. In 1961, the basketball team won the WVIAC Tournament and represented "State" at the NAIA Tournament in Kansas City, Missouri. He was voted Best Male Athlete of the 1961 school year. "Goody" was also a 4 year member of the WVSC (University) marching band and concert band, which had the privilege to tour the eastern United States as recruiters and fund raisers.

Thomas was invited to audition for the Detroit Pistons but, decided to make a career in the military, where he received many prestigious medals and decorations. While serving his country he played basketball in Korea on the International Army Team.

"Goody" and his wife Cynthia of 31 years have 3 beautiful children, Sherri, Terri, Timothy and have been blessed with 6 grandchildren.

WVSU HEAD BASKETBALL COACH



Bryan Poore will be starting his 12th year as Head Basketball Coach at West Virginia State University. He was born in Beckley to his parents David and Martha but, Bryan, his brother Mark and his sister Susie called Winfield home. Bryan graduated from WVSC (University) in 1988 where he received a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He later went on to obtain his Master's from Marshall University in 1994.

Coach Poore began his coaching career as the Assistant Basketball Coach at Hurricane High School in 1988. He was then offered the position of Assistant Basketball Coach with the University of Charleston in 1990. While the head coach of UC took a one year sabbatical, Bryan was then appointed as Interim Head Coach in 1995 and served through 1996.

After leaving the University of Charleston, Bryan accepted the position as the Associate Head Coach at Marshall University from 1996-1999. He then returned to Institute in the spring of 1999 to serve as the Head Basketball Coach of his Alma Mater, "State". Coach Poore has an overall career coaching record of 235-112.

In his spare time, Bryan enjoys playing golf, jogging and watching NASCAR events. He and his wife Jennifer are blessed with two beautiful children, son Trevor and daughter Anna. Coach Poore's family can be seen at all home basketball games and most away games showing their support for the WVSU "Yellow Jackets".

BASKETBALL WVIAC All Tournament 1961 Outstanding Athlete Award


Herbert Benjamin "Chilly" Thompson was born October 25, 1939 in Washington, DC. He attended Paul Lawrence High School where he lettered in tennis and basketball. Herbert led his basketball team to the Metropolitan-Area High School Championship in his senior year. He also was the number one player on the tennis team. "Chilly" overcame paralysis early in his life but, made a remarkable recovery which reflected in his drive to succeed in all his endeavors.

He enrolled at WVSC (University) and became the second leading scorer behind All –American "Bill" LeFevre. Not only was "Chilly" an excellent athlete but, was chosen as President of his Freshman Class, Vice President of the Men's Senate, member of the Student Council, Chairman of the Social Committee and Cadet Captain of the Advanced ROTC program.

Herbert graduated from WVSC (University) with his Bachelor's degree in Mathematics. He was employed as a Mathematical/Systems Analyst at Goddard Space Flight Center, Director of Manpower Information at United Planning Organization and a Program Analyst/Senior Appeals Examiner for the District of Columbia Government, which he retired from in 1991. "Chilly" was one of the first officers in the National "W" Club and most active in writing the by-laws.

Herbert "Chilly" Thompson was the loving father of two daughters, Traci and Kela and had one grandson, Trey.

He will always be remembered for his dedication to the success of his Alma Mater. "Chilly" passed away on September 14, 2003.



WILLIAM S. TOSÉ Class of 1972

Honorary Inductee

William is an active member of WVSU Greater Williamsburg Alumni Chapter. While at WVSU, Bill was a two-sport athlete in football and baseball from 1968-72. After graduation from State, Tosé returned to Williamsburg and immediately got involved in youth programs. Not only was he a teacher and coach, but he was an outstanding recruiter for his alma mater. Among those he encouraged to attend State are Dwayne

"Scooter" Freeman, Dwight Street and Edgar Randall. All have been inducted into the WVSU Sports Hall of Fame. At one time Coach Tosé drove six players to Institute. He has always been a loyal supporter of State and has sent many athletes to our university.

Coaching was in William's blood and he excelled in his chosen profession. Tosé started coaching career in middle schools and worked his way up to the college level. He coached three lottery picks in the NBA, Allen Iverson, Alonzo Mourning and Joe Smith, along with other NBA and NFL players; such as Brian Randall, son of WVS (University) Hall of Famer, Edgar Randall. William's last coaching position was at The Apprentice School where his teams won three AAU National Championships and two small college national championships in seven seasons. Coach Tosé's teams were ranked in the top 10 out of 12 seasons and his teams earned 60 single game season and career records. His total overall record was 940 wins out of 1,437 games; twenty of his students were named USCAA All Americans; his teams won two national collegiate championships; he coached six All-State college division players.

Bill has been recognized for his accomplishments by being named Small College Coach of the Year; USCAA National Coach of the Year for two consecutive years; and Man of the Year by the Williamsburg Men's Club. He also received President's Award and Board of Directors' Award from the Peninsula Sports Club.

William retired from the Williamsburg-James County School System this summer after 38 years of service and teaching. Bill's legacy is his commitment to helping students become good citizens and the best athletes possible.

William Tosé is married to the former Gail Fowler. The couple are the proud parents of two sons, William, Jr. and Ryan. He graduated from Bruton Heights High School, West Virginia State University, and Old Dominion University Master's Program in Norfolk, VA.
